# SPC looks to state tournament after second-place finish

St. Petersburg College finished second over the weekend in the St. Petersburg College Volleyball Classic. It was the best finish ever in the tournament for the hosts.

SPC (25-6) lost twice in the two-day tournament, both times to Parkland, Ill., and won four matches.

The focus for SPC is now on the state tournament at Polk Community

College Nov. 2-4. Despite finishing in a three-way tie in the Suncoast Conference for first place with Pasco-Hernando Community College and Hillsborough CC with an 8-2 record, SPC earned the third seed for the tournament. Seeding was determined by the number of points scored in conference matches.

The third seed means SPC will

meet longtime nemesis PHCC in the opening round.

The state tournament is divided into regions – the Gulf and the Atlantic. Other teams in the Gulf are Pensacola and Hillsborough. The winners of the Gulf and the Atlantic earn trips to the national tournament.

Before the state tournament, SPC has a tri-match Saturday at PHCC with Florida Community College of Jacksonville rounding out the field. Tuesday night, SPC downed Clearwater Christian College in four games.

# Thank You Concert

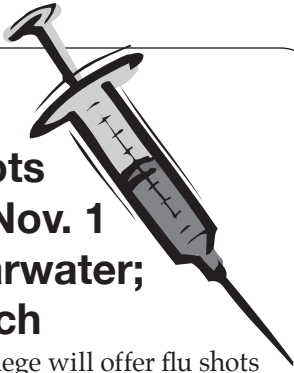

## If you receive a bomb threat, ask questions of caller

September was National Preparedness Month. Dennis Mosser, a manager in Security, Risk Management and Security Operations, began a 10-point series in the Blue & White Sept. 15. Part 7 is published today.

If you receive a bomb threat by telephone, try to remain calm and keep the caller talking to obtain as much information as possible. If possible, ask someone nearby to notify Security Dispatch at Ext. 2560 that a caller is making a bomb threat against the College.

Make notes of the following:

- Date and time of call
- Age and gender of the caller
- Any distinguishable speech patterns – regional or foreign accent, slow, fast
- Emotional state - nervous, agitated, arrogant, apologetic
- Background noises – other voices, traffic sounds, TV, radio, machinery, aircraft

Try to remain calm, take notes if possible and ask the caller the following questions:

- What time is the bomb set to explode?
- Where is the bomb located?
- What kind of bomb is it?
- What does the bomb look like?
- Are there other bombs besides the one mentioned initially?
- Why did you plant the bomb?
- What is your name or what do you want to be called?
- Do you have a personal complaint against the College or do you represent an organization? If so, what do you feel the College could do to correct the complaint?

- Where are you calling from?
- Do you know that innocent people could be hurt?

When you end the phone call, contact Security Dispatch at Ext. 2560 and your Provost’s/Site Administrator’s Office to provide the details of your discussion with the caller. Security and your Provost/Site Administrator will make the decision regarding the need for evacuation of a building(s).

After doing a visual check of your work area or building for suspicious items (bomb), report any suspicious items to Security and law enforcement or emergency services personnel.

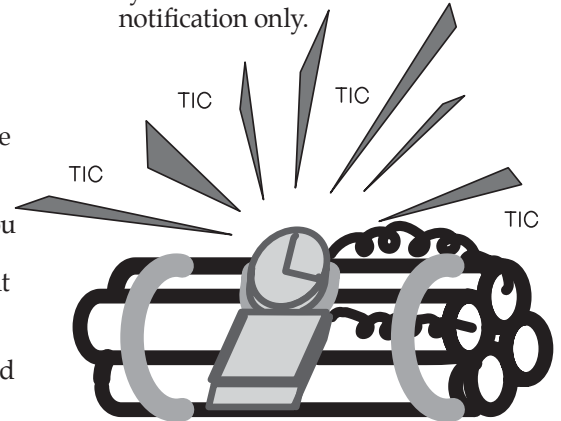
### USE CAUTION WHILE LOOKING FOR SUSPICIOUS ITEMS

**DO NOT** touch or move anything. **DO NOT** open or close drawers or doors.

**DO NOT** turn lights or electrical devices on or off.

**DO NOT** use two-way radios or cell phones.

**DO NOT** activate the fire alarm system for evacuation – use verbal notification only.

## BIDS, EXPENDITURES AND CONTRACTS (through Purchasing)

The Board accepted the Quarterly Report of exempt and non-exempt purchases not exceeding \$250,000 each. The Board authorized flexibility for specification changes to printing and auxiliary services in regard to the National Terrorism Prepared Institute contract with the Department of Defense Technical Support Working Group.

## OTHER EXPENDITURES AND CONTRACTS (exceeding \$250,000)

Approval was given by the Board to enter into the following agreements: (1) Law Tech Consultants, LLC for Interview and Interrogation classes for the Multijurisdictional Counterdrug Task Force Training Program (MCTFT); and (2) Brevard Community College for development of the Freshman Financial Lab concept. The Board accepted the Quarterly Report of contract and other items not exceeding \$250,000 each. The Board further approved development of a contract whereby SPC would contract with LRMA to provide cultural activities and programs in support of SPC's Humanities programs.

## CAPITAL OUTLAY (Money that can be spent only on construction projects)

The Board accepted the Quarterly Report of construction contract approvals not exceeding \$250,000 each. The Board approved the following: (1) Disposition of surplus or obsolete property; (2) Annual selection of pre-qualified small contractors; (3) Phase III construction documents and GMP for renovations/remodeling for offices and support, Annex 3 (Homeland Security) Building, EpiCenter; (4) Phase III construction documents, GMP, and contract award for entrance/redesign of Belcher extension, Tarpon Springs Campus; and (5) Naming of the EpiCenter in honor of former State Sen. Donald C. Sullivan. The Board further approved administrative staff proceeding with a proposed plan for 3-year completion of capital outlay projects on the Clearwater Campus, using SCIF bonding and PECO funds.

## CHANGES TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES' RULES

The Board approved changes to the Rules and Procedures Manual in regard to Rule 6Hx23-4.30 Class Attendance. This change implements a standard policy for class attendance, which requires instructors to record student attendance in an online format and delineates maximum total absences a student may have before being administratively withdrawn from a course.
