

State awards more than \$210,000 to SPC programs

St. Petersburg College will receive more than \$210,000 in SUCCEED, Florida! Career Education Grants.

The money is earmarked for Nursing (\$128,000) and Alternative Teacher Certification (\$85,000) programs at SPC.

Lt. Gov. Toni Jennings and Education Commissioner John L. Winn made the announcement in Tallahassee Monday as part of the allocation of \$33.4-million for colleges and universities throughout the state.

Through this funding provided by the Florida Legislature, the Florida Department of Education (DOE) will award 87 new competitive grants to support new and expanding programs in nursing/allied health, manufacturing, automotive technology and teacher certification in public and private career centers, community colleges and universities – all areas designated by Enterprise Florida and Workforce Florida as targeted sectors for statewide economic development.

Established in 2005, the SUCCEED, Florida! grant program is designed to build capacity for education programs to meet the state's most critical needs.

SPC chosen for national retention project

SPC's Title III program has been selected for "Foundations of Excellence in the First College Year." The college is one of 35 in the country that will participate.

This one-year project consists of utilizing a recently developed model of excellence for first-year students. It allows colleges to develop and review

Jobs have been combined for campus technology support

If you operate a computer or audiovisual equipment at the college, here's a new term you'll want to become acquainted with immediately: Technology Resource Specialist, or TRS.

That's the title of those to turn to for help.

There are no more computer support specialists or audiovisual technologists. They've undergone a name change, and their jobs have been melded and expanded.

"We've enriched the job content of the former computer support specialists and former audiovisual technologists by combining those responsibilities into a new job," said Conferlete Carney, vice president

of Information Systems, Business Services, Planning and Budget.

"As a part of this enrichment, they will have the combined responsibility for computer software support and audiovisual equipment support – and they'll have computer hardware to support, which will be an added responsibility."

Carney said the additional training they've received included instruction in the support of interactive classrooms on the various learning sites. Training will be ongoing, he said, and will include Dell Computer Certification for those who need it.

"Overall, this was driven by the fact that over the past few years, all of these technologies have been converging," Carney said. "All of that equipment is now network-connected."

"This has created a great opportunity for us in terms of upgrades, and it should be exciting for our campus technologists in terms of job enrichment and growth opportunities . . . new learning opportunities as well as salary enrichment."

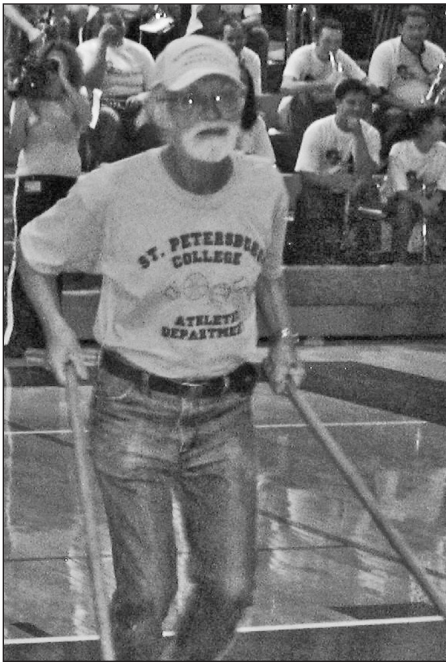

Philip McGauran – ‘Sweepin’ Phil’ – dies at age 70

Philip Michael McGauran, a college custodian for 14 years who earned the nickname “Sweepin’ Phil” from basketball fans, died Aug. 24 at his St. Petersburg home. He was 70.

Mr. McGauran, who also was a graduate of SPC, retired from Facilities Services in October 2004.

A subtle showman, he earned his nickname the final two or three years of his SPC tenure at the St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus.

During halftime of basketball games in the campus gym, lively music is played over the public address system. One evening, when Mr. McGauran came out with his push brooms to sweep the court, he suddenly broke into a couple of dance steps as he plied the floor.

Fans noticed and loved it. The public address announcer voiced encouragement. “The music just got me started,” he said later. “I started to get a few laughs and it egged me on.”

Soon, he became “Sweepin’ Phil” and could be counted on for a halftime show. His finest hour came the night of Feb. 4, 2004, when a men’s basketball game was televised in front of a standing-room-only crowd in the SP/G gym and he was featured at the half.

A native of New York City, Mr. McGauran had lived here since 1980 and was a member of the Cathedral of St. Jude the Apostle. Survivors include two sons, two daughters, three brothers and three sisters.

A funeral service was Monday.

“The Foundation of Excellence’s Policy Center will assist SPC in making programmatic improvements that will increase student learning, success and persistence.”

The project’s roots began in 1986 with the founding of the University of South Carolina’s National Resource Center for the First Year Experience and Students in Transition.

The Policy Center, an outgrowth of the Resource Center that oversees this project, is an independent, non-profit, higher education policy, advocacy and research center founded in 1999.

The project was launched with 13 colleges in 2002.

Research has shown that new students who are successfully integrated into college are much more likely to succeed. Experts say attention to the first year of college will benefit students by helping them meet their educational goals, and will benefit institutions by helping them retain students through graduation.

“This project is beneficial for SPC in that it falls in line with our ongoing efforts to increase retention rates among our students,” President Carl M. Kuttler, Jr. said. “We are pleased to take part in an initiative that can help to further our students’ progress.”

Tribute to Stan Kenton Nov. 4 will raise funds for Music scholarships

The late Stan Kenton will be honored in a Nov. 4 concert in the Music Center on St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus that’s also a benefit to raise funds for SPC scholarships in Music. It starts at 8 p.m.

“The Artistry of Stan” will feature the Dan McMillion Jazz Orchestra. McMillion, a former trumpeter with the Woody Herman orchestra, will lead his Grammy-nominated, 18-piece ensemble in the tribute.

Kenton (1912-1979) is remembered as one of the most creative of the big-band leaders from the 1940s. He earned fame for helping introduce Afro-Cuban rhythms to U.S. jazz, and for producing compositions that combined jazz and classical music.

General admission is \$20 (\$18 for seniors 65 and older, \$15 for non-SPC students). SPC students and staff have free admission with their college ID. Tickets will be sold only at the door, starting at 6:30 p.m.

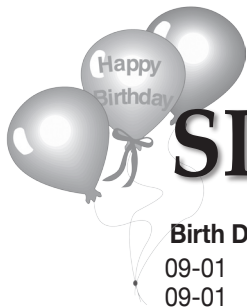

PRESENTATION OF RETIREMENT RESOLUTIONS

The Board adopted retirement resolutions for Susan M. Anderson, Library, EpiCenter; Martha P. Hendrick, Scholarships & Student Financial Assistance, Clearwater Campus; Bonnie R. Jorgenson, Purchasing, EpiCenter; Jean A. McClain, Institutional Advancement, EpiCenter; Sharon J. Nickels, Business Technologies, Clearwater Campus; and Lawrence F. Strickland, Information Systems, Seminole Campus. Dr. Anderson, and Ms. McClain were in attendance and, joined by colleagues, received their resolutions as presented by Chairman Bilirakis and President Kuttler. Ms. Hendrick, Ms. Jorgenson, Ms. Nickels and Mr. Strickland were unable to attend.

WORKSHOP

Prior to the meeting, the Board held a workshop on Technology-Enhanced Innovation in Teaching, Learning and Services, presented by Dr. James Olliver, SE Campus/eCampus provost. The workshop was presented in three segments: (1) Dr. Anita Naravane, Natural Science instructor at the Seminole Campus, was recognized as the recipient of the Excellence in Distance Learning – Outstanding Faculty Member Award from the national Instructional Technology Council of the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC); and Ms. Vicki Westergard, Director of Web & Instructional Technology Services, was recognized on behalf of the Web and Instructional Technology department on the Seminole Campus for receiving the national ANGEL IMPACT Exemplary Program Award; (2) Mr. Jim Gonyea, Career Development Center, reviewed Online Career Development Services (OCDS); and (3) Ms. Westergard demonstrated the St. Petersburg Online Communicator (SPOC).

BIDS, EXPENDITURES AND CONTRACTS (through Purchasing)

The Board approved the purchase of Cisco networking equipment from INX for Annex 3, EpiCenter.

CAPITAL OUTLAY (Money that can be spent only on construction projects)

The Board approved the final Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for FY 2007-2008 through 2011-2012.

FACULTY SALARY SCHEDULE
