Alejandro-de Leon named associate provost of Tarpon Springs Campus

Daniel Alejandro-de Leon, dean of Mathematics and Sciences at Hillsborough Community College, has been named associate provost of the Tarpon Springs Campus.

His new duties will begin March 5.

While he learns about the campus and the college, Alejandro-de Leon will work with Psalms Mack, who has been the acting associate provost since October.

As associate provost, Alejandro-de Leon said he expects to be deeply involved in student affairs.

"This will be an interesting challenge, one that I am looking forward to very much," he said.

Alejandro-de Leon has been at Hillsborough Community College since 2002. Before that, he was coordinator

for five years of Eckerd College's North Pinellas County Center, and served as associate professor at the University of Nevada's

Changes in daylight saving time bring challenges

Congress has changed the dates for daylight saving time this year, and the change could cause problems with some SPC computers, according to Conferlete Carney, vice president of

Information Systems, Business Services, Budgets and Planning.

Because of that, college IT teams are working to install software patches to computers and servers to make sure

all times are accurate before daylight savings time goes into effect March 11.

This year, daylight saving time will start on March 11 and run until Nov. 4 – the second Sunday in March until the first Sunday in November. Traditionally, daylight saving time has run from the first Sunday in April until the last Sunday in October. Many software programs have been designed with those parameters in mind.

Basketball teams look to playoffs as regular season nears end

The regular season has ended for the St. Petersburg College women's basketball team and the men wrap up their season at home Saturday afternoon at 4 against Pasco-Hernando Community College.

The women split two games last week and are 9-20 overall and 4-7 in the Southern Conference.

The conference playoffs begin Saturday for the women. They likely will be on the road, but their opponent was not determined before the *Blue & White* deadline. If the women win Saturday, they will play again Monday night to see if they qualify for the state tournament March 8-10 in Marianna.

The men defeated Manatee 86-85 Saturday night and are 7-3 in the Suncoast Conference and 17-9 overall.

The men played at Polk CC Wednesday night and look as if they will be the conference champion

or the runner-up. They are battling Hillsborough CC for the top spot.

Conference playoffs begin Monday night. If SPC wins the conference, it will earn an automatic berth in the state tournament in Marianna March 8-10. If it finishes second, it will play host to its playoff games.

The baseball team is 12-5 overall after a weekend trip south where it won three of four games.

The team returns home this afternoon for a 1 p.m. game against Queensborough (NY) CC at Jack Russell Stadium. Saturday, two seven-inning games are planned with Broward CC.

The softball team didn't play last week but has the Hillsborough CC tournament this weekend at Plant City.

College of Technology and Management begins work on cyberspace security

The College of Technology & Management has begun work on Information Technology Security Curriculum & Education for Educators (ITSCEE), a new national cyberspace security training program.

The project is funded through a two-year National Science Foundation grant that SPC secured in 2005 in partnership with Seminole Community College and Manatee Community College.

The project involves development of a career ladder for IT security; development of security curricula for educational institutions; and training of community college

faculty for SSCP (Systems Security Certified Practitioner), CISSP (Certified Information Systems Security Professional), or CompTIA (Computing Technology Industry Association) certification.

The career progression from Technical Certificate to Associate in Science degree to Bachelor of Applied Science is being created in collaboration with the A.S. degree program in Information Technology Security at the Allstate Center.

College of Technology and Management Dean Shri Goyal and instructor Sean Kenney are leading the SPC effort.

College Goal Sunday is this week at SPC's EpiCenter

College Goal Sunday is this week from 2 to 5 p.m. at the EpiCenter.

College Goal Sunday is a statewide program that provides information and assistance to students applying for college financial assistance. Professionals from colleges and universities help the students and their families complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), which is required by colleges to determine aid eligibility.

The program targets first-generation, low-income and minority students. Dependent students should bring their parents' IRS 1040 tax return, W-2 and other income and benefits information.

Financial assistance volunteers will be available to help students with the registration process. Sign language interpreters also will be available to assist the hearing-impaired.

SAT prep course begins Saturday

SAT prep classes are Saturday mornings from 9 to noon, beginning this week at the Seminole, Tarpon Springs, Clearwater and Downtown St. Petersburg sites. The classes will help students prepare for Scholastic Aptitude Tests on May 5.

Students from area private and public high schools and home-schooled students may take the course for \$175. The cost includes a textbook.

The classes include math and verbal portions, and new essay writing tips and practice. Students will take official retired practice tests, do remedial exercises, review questions and receive important test-taking strategies.

Another SAT prep course will be offered at Palm Harbor University High School from 2 to 4 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, beginning March 6. That cost is also \$175, and includes a textbook.

All classes are taught by SPC English and math adjunct instructors.

Microsoft, HP, Oracle and other software companies have developed patches to make appropriate time changes in their systems to reflect the new daylight saving time start and end dates, and the college has been looking into what it needs to do to make the necessary changes in its operating systems and databases.

"If we don't install the software patches supplied by the vendors, all scheduling in Outlook will be off by an hour," according to Ken Pereira, director of Learning Management and Student Support Systems. "In addition, any systems that are time dependent, such as PeopleSoft or ANGEL, would be off by an hour as well."

Making the appropriate fixes campuswide is a challenge because

SPC has so many servers and computers, Pereira said.

"If you think about all the labs and administration and staff and faculty computers, all of them have to be updated," Pereira said. "Some can be done automatically, but it still takes a fair amount of time, and we want to make those changes while not interfering with everyone's normal business day."

Pereira said the ANGEL and PeopleSoft environments already have been successfully updated. The Outlook e-mail and calendar software patches should be completed by the last weekend in February.

Daya Pendharkar, associate vice president of Information Systems, said the updates will allow the college's

desktop computers to change times automatically. He said SPC has about 200 different servers, and each of them requires that patches be installed manually. All of that work has been completed, Pendharkar said.

Rather than simply installing the patches, the IT teams have been making fixes and then returning to double-check the work, a more time-consuming process designed to avoid problems when the new daylight saving time goes into effect.

"Sometimes when you apply the patch you find a problem," Pereira said, "so we are taking time to go back and double-check our work. We are shooting for the first week of March to have everything in place and verified."
