MySPC Answer Place (MAP) debuts on two campuses

Last year, the college hired a pair of consulting firms to make recommendations to improve the way the college delivers services to students. Now, one of the recommendations from those firms is being implemented at the St. Petersburg/Gibbs and Clearwater campuses, starting Monday.

The advice was to develop a single location on each campus where students could go for answers to questions about admission, advising, registration, testing, the business office and financial assistance. Associate Vice President for Enrollment Management Pat Rinard responded by assembling a team that created the MySPC Answer Place (MAP).

"Incorporating MySPC into the name of this department was important because this new model places emphasis on teaching students how to empower themselves by using the MySPC student self-service system," Rinard said. Within the MAP, students can greatly reduce the number of trips

they must make from one department to another, Rinard said.

"By cross-training in the areas of admissions, registration, advising, testing, student financials, and financial assistance, our students will be better served and hopefully will find access to these services less

Wellness update

Manage your weight with lifestyle

Weight management is a confusing topic, and it's big business. Just look at the countless diets, diet books and supplements on the market to help us become slim and trim. But even with all these quick-fix solutions, Americans continue to gain weight.

As defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), "overweight" and "obese" are both labels for ranges of weight that are greater than what is generally considered healthy for a given height.

To make it all more confusing, a recent study by the CDC suggests that being a little overweight (20 to 25 pounds) does not always bring with it negative health. Body weight in this study was determined by using a body mass index (BMI) formula, which is calculated using your height and weight.

To calculate your BMI, go to www.aetnahealthybody.com and click Calculate Your BMI.

BMI's in the range of 25 to 29.9 are considered overweight. A BMI greater than 30 is considered obese. Obese individuals, the study found, face greater health risks, including heart disease, diabetes and certain cancers.

There is a correlation between your BMI and the amount of fat on your body, but there are limitations to using the BMI — especially if you are a very muscular person.

The location of fat on your body makes a difference to your health. It is less detrimental to carry a few extra pounds on your hips than it is around your waist. Extra fat in your middle carries extra health risks because this fat is closer to vital internal organs.

A waist measurement of greater than 40 inches for men and greater than 35 inches for women puts those in a high risk category for disease.

The recent CDC study may give an indication that a few extra pounds aren't anything to worry about, but its findings shouldn't be seen as a free pass. You still need to strive to reach and maintain a healthy weight.

There is no quick fix for weight loss. Most health experts agree that a healthy weight is best achieved by balancing healthy eating with some physical activity.

Fad diets may work for the short-term, but the majority of weight and, often, even more weight, will be regained.

Ethics students take part in cleanup as class requirement

About 25 ethics students took part in the annual Great American Cleanup program on March 15 as part of their ethics program course work.

The students, some with spouses and children in tow, picked up cigarette butts, plastic items of all kinds and other refuse for several hours along the Memorial Causeway in Clearwater.

The cleanup was sponsored by the Clearwater Parks and Recreation Department.

"It was a teaching activity to show what it means to give back to the community," said Jane Till, an assistant professor at SPC's Applied Ethics Institute. "It is one's moral obligation as a citizen."

Till said SPC ethics

students have been taking part in cleanup activities at Clearwater's Coachman Ridge Park for the past three years under a contract

frustrating," he said. "Navigating through college is not always easy, and we want the MAP to be the first place students go to with their questions."

The campuses still will have academic advisors and financial assistance officers to aid students when they need more in-depth help, Rinard said.

Under the direction of Cynthia Jolliff-Johnson, director of College-Wide MAPs, employees began intensive training on Feb. 15. Cross-training will

with Clearwater Parks and Recreation. This year, the city asked the college to shift gears and take part in the Great American Cleanup activities on the causeway instead.

"It is a way of actually doing something with your ethical beliefs," Till said. "If the wrong thing to do is to pollute, then the right thing to do is to participate in the cleanup. Ethics is a discussion about what is right and what is wrong."

Students from the Tarpon Springs, Clearwater, Seminole, St. Petersburg/Gibbs and Downtown campuses took part, Till said. Online students also participated.

continue indefinitely, he said.

"We have not always done a good job of consistent and ongoing training," Rinard said. "This approach places a heavy emphasis on making sure our front-line staff has the tools necessary to do their jobs."

The MAP model will roll out on the Seminole and Tarpon Springs campuses in time for Spring 2009 registration.

of New Orleans and now affiliated with Buffalo State College, will discuss the general subject of critical thinking from 8-10 a.m. in the Digitorium. He will discuss Teaching for Critical Thinking from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Institute of Government Conference center in the library annex. There will be a break for lunch.

Critical thinking was selected as the topic for SPC's Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP), developed as part of the college's accreditation reaffirmation effort. The QEP addresses issues that contribute to the improvement of student learning.

In a telephone interview from his Buffalo State College office, Nosich praised SPC's ongoing QEP efforts.

"What St. Petersburg College is doing is a very exciting, very authentic thing to be doing," Nosich said. "In my judgment, a lot of teaching that takes place in colleges and universities involves memorization, temporary knowledge or minimal understanding, and it often is not aimed at getting students to really understand the subject matter."

Students can succeed by simply developing school skills, he said, and they may never fully develop the

skills that allow them to thoroughly understand a subject they are studying.

"Any program in college that aims at furthering student understanding, or the grasp of material rather than regurgitation, is a very exciting path to be taking," he said.

His approach during his visit at SPC will focus on how to teach students to do more than simply memorizing, reacting or getting answers or solutions that come top-of-the-head.

"In short, it involves getting students to think their way through the subject matter of a course," he said.

Nosich has been working in the field of critical thinking since the 1970s, when he decided students were not learning to think in his philosophy courses. He noticed that students could retain information from his lectures, but could not respond successfully to similar, analogous questions.
