



Board tours new O&P building

The college's Board of Trustees tour the new Bankers Insurance Group Building, home of the J.E. Hanger College of Orthotics and Prosthetics, before the May 16 meeting at the Caruth Health Education Center. Classes were held for the first time on May 12 at the two-story, 26,500-square-foot building. The \$11.1-million project makes the college one of the only in the country with state-of-the-art O&P equipment. O&P Dean Sam Phillips explains the parallel bars during the tour.

Pay and benefits package approved

The Board of Trustees on May 16 approved a pay and benefits package for 2008-09 that adds an additional 4 to 4.5 percent to compensation costs.

President Carl M. Kuttler Jr. announced the plan to employees in a recorded message.

Here are the highlights:

- Budgeted employees will receive a one-time, non-recurring adjustment of 2 percent. The checks will be issued in early July.
- Most of the medical plan features will remain unchanged from 2007-08, including co-pays for doctor visits and prescriptions. Employees who meet the

wellness criteria will continue to be rewarded with a discounted rate that remains the same as the current year. Employees who do not qualify for the discounted rate — including those who smoke or have a covered dependent who smokes — will see their rates increase significantly to cover a greater portion of the actual cost of their coverage.

- The college is beginning a self-funded group dental plan, modeled on the self-funded health insurance plan. Under the new plan, employees will have a wider range of choices, including the ability to see licensed dentists in or out of the Aetna network. The new plan will include orthodontic coverage, and employee-only

Senior administrators add assignments after reorganization

The college continues to make changes in the way it manages its business in order to become more efficient. The most recent changes involve the reassignment of administrative functions overseen by the college's senior vice presidents and other senior managers.

"Tighter state budgets have required us to look at ways to reorganize and find new efficiencies," President Carl M. Kuttler Jr. said. "We have asked our senior level administrators to take on new and additional responsibilities in order to get more performance out of every dollar, and they have stepped up."

Data center move will disrupt service

The college's data center will move over the Memorial Day weekend from the Seminole Campus to the District Office. This will create some disruptions in service as systems are moved and updated. Faculty, especially, will need to take appropriate action to incorporate the move window into their class plans.

Between 1 p.m. today and midnight Monday, the following systems will be unavailable:

Backups will be done for each system before it is shut down and moved.

All office computers and student classroom and lab computers will retain Internet access. The outage also will not affect phone service or employee and student e-mail.

Moving the data center will:

- Enhance the availability of our systems during power outages with a generator and a new UPS systems (battery backup system).
- Provide the space necessary to grow and expand the college's use of technology.
- Secure our Data Center in a weather hardened environment.
- Provide much needed space for growth at the Seminole Campus.

Wellness update

What's your number?

Recent health studies find that there's another number — besides blood pressure and cholesterol — that may indicate the state of your health: your waist measurement. It's important to strive for a healthy body weight, but where you carry your fat may have greater medical significance.

Some recent findings:

- It is healthier to be pear-shaped (with more fat at the hips and buttocks) than apple shaped (with more fat around the abdomen).
- Abdominal fat is more of a health risk because of its close proximity to internal organs and its metabolic effects.
- Men generally are associated with the apple-shaped accumulation of fat around the middle, but women may take on this shape after menopause.
- Gender, age, genetics and hormones all dictate where fat is deposited.
- The ideal healthy waist measurement for men is 40 inches or less; for women, it is 35 inches or less.
- Studies indicate an association between a large abdominal girth in middle age and the risk of dementia in later years.
- Studies indicate an association between excessive abdominal fat and diabetes, high blood pressure, stroke, heart disease, gallbladder disease, sleep apnea and some cancers.
- A Canadian research team found that abdominal fat produces a hormone that encourages the development of more fat.
- You can't spot reduce, so sit ups won't burn belly fat. Aerobic exercise (like brisk walking) will reduce fat from all over the body, including the belly.
- The Flat Belly Diet is a new diet craze. Michael Jensen, a Mayo Clinic obesity researcher and endocrinology specialist, recently said that it is premature to associate specific diet or food with belly fat. WEB MD, however, has said the Flat Belly Diet appears to be a safe, calorie-controlled, plant-based eating plan for weight reduction.
- There is no magic bullet to reduce abdominal fat, but eating a little less and exercising a little more will lead to overall body fat loss, and that includes fat around the middle.

coverage will be paid by the college.

- The college is setting aside \$50,000 to expand tuition coverage for employees and their families for baccalaureate degrees.
- The pay and benefits package also includes money for international exchanges for faculty and staff; job reclassifications; and upgrades to qualifying faculty if higher degrees are attained.
- The board had previously approved offering three-month contracts to A&P staff because of the uncertainty of the amount of state funding we would receive. The board now has authorized 12-month contracts for most A&P staff.

Summer SAT prep classes

The changes will: 1) require completion of the pre-entry, general education and support course requirements within established criteria; 2) require students to obtain the required immunizations, titers and/or screenings and maintain them throughout the program; 3) require students to go through the selective admission process for readmission in the Nursing Program upon having failed or withdrawn from any course within the first session of the Nursing Program; 4) require students to have valid Health Care Provider CPR Certification and maintain it throughout the program; 5) recommend that LPN transitional students (day schedule) complete most general education and support courses prior to entrance in May; 6) establish that applicants who have earned an A.A., Baccalaureate or higher degree from an accredited institution are waived from the additional Humanities elective pre-entry course requirement; 7) establish that students who have any combination of two failures in any of the Nursing I, II, III & IV Clinical or Nursing Care Management courses will be dismissed and unable to return to the Nursing Program and 8) establish that program classes may be offered during the day or evening based on availability. Also during the Rule Development stage, considerations may be given to changes, additions and/or deletions of any part of this Rule as may be recommended.
