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Call to Order

Michelle Mann called the meeting to order at 10:01 am followed by a welcome and introduction of members present.

Agenda Items

Introduction - Dr. Susan Demers, Dean, College of Public Safety

Dr. Demers welcomed the advisory committee members and provided a brief summary of the role that each member has on the committee. Following state statutory mandates, St. Petersburg College has advisory committees comprised of alumni, industry and community leaders whose expertise helps keep our curriculum relevant, provides a forum for the exchange of ideas and

offers opportunities for students to network with industry executives. Dr. Demers emphasized keys areas of participation by committee members:

- 1. Recruiting information. Provide the requirements and characteristics for a successful employee in the agency/business.
- 2. Skillsets. What skills and abilities should our students own in order to be considered for employment?

This information will ensure our programs are relevant and up to date and will guarantee our students are equipped upon entering their chosen career path.

Program Updates

Each faculty member provided updates for their program. Notable highlights are:

- 1. Michael Hughes, Department Chair, gave an overview of all College of Public Safety Programs.
- 2. Rosanne Beck, (Faculty, four-year program) is working with Kevin Thomas to create an upper division digital forensics sub-plan. Additionally, Ms. Beck and Dr. Rasor have identified the need for a course in de-escalation; they are working on the curriculum to be offered in 2022.
- 3. Lynn Ernst (Crime Scene Technology) is planning live events for students and the community to showcase the program. Crime Scene Technology was the last of the lower division programs to move to the St. Petersburg Gibbs Campus, which took place Summer 2020. The move allows for opportunities to greater interaction students and campus events.
- 4. Kevin Thomas (Digital Forensics and Computer Investigations) provided more detail on the four-year digital forensics sub-plan. The new subplan will contain four courses:
 - a. Introduction to Cybercrime
 - b. Digital Forensics for Public Safety
 - c. Mobile Device Forensics (created by Michael Rios, Adjunct)
 - d. Advanced Topics in Forensics (dark web, cloud-based networks)

Kevin is hosting an event, via Zoom, for students, which will focus on on-line safety, phishing attacked, and identity theft.

Community Connections

Kerry Carter, Career Outreach Specialist, provided an update on the programs and initiatives that were held to promote and support our Public Safety students.

- 1. Assist students identify a career path.
- 2. Professional development concentrating on interview and writing skills.
- 3. So that students can experience the day-to-day activities of different public safety departments, Kerry is work with the agencies to seek out job-shadowing opportunities.

- 4. Began a St. Petersburg College chapter of the Florida Emergency Preparedness Association (FEPA). FEPA, comprised of 67 Florida county emergency administrators, promotes professional expertise and diversity through training and education and sharing best practices. Students involved with FEPA will provide network opportunities and exposure to the functions of emergency management.
- 5. Invited members to join *Hire SPC Titans* Handshake (joinhandshake.com) for recruiting students for internships or employment. This platform, widely used by career service department nationwide, allows student to search for organizations and agencies in their chosen field, as well as organizations can recruit students based on a query search.

Student Experience

The student advisory committee members shared their experiences as St. Petersburg College students. Some of the highpoints of their time with the college:

- 1. Events and job fairs are invaluable and many times lead to employment opportunities
- 2. The college focuses on the student and prepares them for workforce.
- 3. Faculty provide support and encouragement.
- 4. The program prepares the student for advanced degrees.

Cindy Bresse, who is with the Sarasota County Sheriff's Office as a supervisor in their emergency Operations Center, had a very positive experience with SCP. Cindy earned a degree in Crime Scene Technology. However, she expressed a concern for the lack of communication training in the law enforcement program. Skillset is lacking in the ability to relay emergency information and incident reporting.

Public Safety Events

The College of Public Safety recently hosted the following events:

- 1. Minorities in Law Enforcement: A Candid Conversation with Mr. Leon Jackson, which gave students the opportunity to hear from a former City of St. Petersburg police officer.
- 2. A Candid Conversation: Women in Public Safety, held during women's history month.

A new initiative for the College of Public Safety, is the creation of the Public Safety Speakers Bureau. The advisory committee members will be invited to speak to our students either through individual classes or at an event so that are students are provided valuable insights and information on the agency/departments represented.

Advisory Committee Members Open Discussion

Board members provided their agency's/department's training requirement and what they are looking for in a candidate:

- 1. Practice experience and critical thinking skills.
- 2. Communication skills
- 3. Well-rounded; ability to communicate well and handle all different kinds of situations
- 4. Time management

The College of Public Safety is re-evaluating their internship policies to better align with the needs of agencies/departments that we serve. While recognizing that providing real-world experience for students may be a challenge due to privacy concerns and liability issues, the committee members were asked how they could support an internship program and outline their requirements.

Public Safety Certificate Programs

Michael Hughes gave an overview of all of our certificate programs which enables many of our students to gain employment. It also simplifies the process for students who return to the college to seek a degree.

Public Safety Industry Chair

- Role of the Industry Chairperson
 - Advisory committee members elect a chairperson for a term of one year. The chairperson presides over committee meetings, acts as spokesperson, and sets committee meeting dates. The chairperson collaborates with the program administrator to prepare notices of meetings and agendas
 - The responsibility of the Industry Chair is to work about with the Program Administrator.







COVID 19

- SPC is guided by information from the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Other contributing best practices and guidelines include the Florida Governor's Office, Florida Department of Education, Pinellas County Health Department, Pinellas County Emergency Management and the Division of Florida Colleges.
- Phases 1, 2 and 3 have been fulfilled.
- The plan involves four phases:
 - Phase 4, effective the week of Jan. 3, 2021: Spring classes will begin, with an expansion of on-campus student services. The capacity of face-to-face classes is still to be determined.

- The program will engage in regular meetings and information and input with community stakeholders as participants and members of the <u>Public Safety Advisory Board</u>.



Associate in Science degree program allows students to meet the entrance requirements to continue the BAS degree in Public Safety Administration.





Crime Scene Technology - AS

- Law Enforcement Officers rely on the support and expertise of trained Crime Scene Technicians.
- · A career as a Crime Scene Technician requires specialized training in the areas of photography, examination and processing of physical evidence both at the Crime Scene or in the laboratory
- The skills necessary to achieve a career as a Crime Scene Technician may be obtained through the Crime Scene Technology Program at St. Petersburg College
 - The program teaches crime scene technicians the skills to locate, identify, process and preserve crime scenes.
 - In addition, students learn to testify about their findings in court.

Digital Forensics & Computer Investigations-AS

- Professional training program in which students will learns skills in researching, investigating, using computer software, interpreting laws, and using the Internet as an investigative tool.

- Students will be prepared for careers in corporate computer security investigation or similar careers in computer security and law enforcement.




Public Safety Administration Digital Forensics Sub-Plan Learning Outcomes

- 1. The student will demonstrate an understanding of the acts and theories of cybercrime, cyber terrorism, and information warfare.
 2. The student will demonstrate how to determine which investigative methods are relevant to a particular case, and which software and hardware tools are appropriate to that investigation.
- 3. The student will demonstrate the ability to employ commonly used digital forensic tools and how to implement best practices for managing and processing evidence.

 4. The student will demonstrate an understanding of the methods and procedures used in typical computer forensics examinations, including how to extract data from diverse operating systems and storage devices.
- 5. The student will be able to articulate how different mobile devices store information and to compare and contrast the different procedures used in iOS investigations versus Android investigations.

 6. The student will be able to summarize the unique challenges presented by mobile device cases, situations involving cloud-based data, memory analysis, and dark web investigations.


